PANOPO 65th Anniversary Celebration on Track for August 3-5

The U.S. Navy and the Nautilus Alumni Association are celebrating the 65th anniversary of USS Nautilus' historic 1958 trip to the North Pole under the Arctic ice. The main event will be conducted on the pier alongside Historic Ship Nautilus at the Submarine Force Library and Museum in Groton, CT on August 4, 2023, with PANOPO crew, other crew, families, and key Navy leaders in attendance. The museum and the museum store will also be open for visiting before and after the main event.

NAAI has arranged for a block of rooms at the Hilton Garden Inn, only a couple of miles from Nautilus, for a nightly rate of \$199 plus taxes—substantially lower than the hotel's normal August rates of \$262 per night. We have also issued a DRAFT agenda for the 3-5 August celebration with some great events planned in addition to the ship side ceremony. President's Report

As reported elsewhere in this newsletter, planning for the 65th anniversary PANOPO celebration is well underway. It certainly promises to be a great celebration with lots of fun for all.

Many of you expressed concerns at the 2022 reunion that the Nautilus scholarships have been given only to applicants seeking to attend 4-year colleges. That those who want to go to trade or vocational schools are being left out. Well, that has changed.

Pat Anderson and I ensured that the rules for Nautilus scholarships specifically instruct the Dolphin Scholarship Foundation that administers our scholarships to entertain applications from all three categories, 4-year, 2-year, and trade, and that one scholarship be awarded in each category so long as there are applicants in the three categories. Further, that applicants will compete only with others in the same category.

The application window closed the end of March with 30 applications. Sixteen of the applicants were not eligible because they were unrelated to a Nautilus crew member. Of the eligible fourteen applications, thirteen were for 4-year colleges and one was for a trade/vocational school.

So, the word is getting out. The Nautilus Facebook page is largely responsible for publicizing the Nautilus scholarships and explaining that trade/vocational applications will be considered alongside college applications. Thanks to Bret Strode and Wanda Sells!

Plans are also being made for the 2024 Nautilus Reunion that will be held 13-17 September 2024. Once again, it will be in the Groton, CT area so crew members can visit our boat at the Submarine Force Library and Museum. Negotiations are ongoing with the Hilton Groton Inn, the location of the 2022 reunion, to host the 2024 reunion. More to follow.

Lastly, we are still seeking to locate missing crew members. Bob Keehn, former NAAI secretary, has taken on the task of locating the few PANOPOs we've been unable to contact. NAAI's membership chair remains open. Hopefully, a volunteer will step forward to take on the task of searching for missing crew and add to the outstanding work done by former chair Jim Kronenwetter. Dolphins Now Command the International Space Station



First Submariner in Space Now Commands Space Station Stephen G. Bowen (Captain, U.S. Navy, Ret.) launched to the International Space Station as Commander of NASA's SpaceX Crew-6 mission aboard a SpaceX Crew Dragon spacecraft on March 2, 2023 and successfully docked with the International Space Station where he is now in command. Bowen was the first *Submarine Officer* to be selected as an astronaut by NASA and the first to fly in orbit. Bowen is a veteran of three Space Shuttle missions - STS-126, STS-132 and STS-133. He has logged more than 40 days in space including 47 hours and 18 minutes in seven spacewalks. Bowen spent three years attached to USS PARCHE (SSN 683) and completed qualification in Submarines on USS POGY (SSN 647). After attending the MIT/WHOI Joint Program in Ocean Engineering he reported to USS AUGUSTA (SSN 710) for duty as the Engineering Officer.



Female Submarine Officer also Served Aboard Space Station. LCDR Kayla Barron, U.S. Navy, was selected by NASA to join the 2017 Astronaut Candidate Class. She reported for duty in August 2017. The Washington native graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy with a bachelor's degree in Systems Engineering. As a *Submarine Warfare Officer*, Barron was a member of the first class of women commissioned into the submarine community and qualified in submarines aboard the ballistic missile submarine, USS Maine. She served as a member of the NASA SpaceX Crew-3 mission to the International Space Station, which launched on November 10, 2021, and splashed down on Friday, May 6, 2022, completing 177 days in orbit.

Commanding Officer, USS Nautilus (SSN-571), April 1967 - January 1970

Captain Norman Earl Griggs, U.S. Navy, Ret., of McLean, Virginia passed away on February 26, 2023, one week shy of his 92nd birthday. He was born on March 6, 1931, and graduated in 1953 from the U.S. Naval Academy. He had a distinguished Naval career that spanned 23 years, serving on the destroyer USS Rowe, submarine USS Tiru, nuclear powered submarines USS Scorpion, USS Robert E Lee, and as the *Commanding Officer of the USS Nautilus from 1967-1970*, followed by two submarine related jobs at the Pentagon in the offices of the Chief of Naval Operations and Secretary of Defense. He retired as a Captain in 1976. He then received a law degree and practiced law for 23 years in McLean, VA. He is survived by his wife of 68 years, Mary Lou, and daughters Mary and Meredith. He will be fondly remembered by the Nautilus crew who served with him and by the Nautilus Alumni Association. Sailor, Rest Your Oar!




PHOTOS FROM THE 1958 PANOPO TRIP UNDER THE ICE TO THE NORTH POLE



















Old Shipmate News: We've heard from Peggy Fogarty McGee, daughter of Captain Francis Fogarty who Commanded USS Nautilus from 1963 to 1967. Peggy reports that Captain Fogarty is approaching his 99th birthday and will not likely be able to attend the PANOPO anniversary celebration. CAPT Fogarty also served aboard Nautilus in 1957 during its first foray under the ice but, before the 1958 polar trip, he was selected as prospective engineering officer for the USS Skipjack, the lead ship of the new class of nuclear subs with whale-shaped hulls. Many active NAAI members who served aboard Nautilus in the mid-60s remember Captain Fogarty well, especially how he so masterfully recovered Nautilus after its collision with the aircraft carrier USS Essex, bringing it back to the surface and keeping over 100 men from descending to Davy Jones Locker.








<u>NAAI Looks to Award Copies of PUC and Medals</u>: NAAI is researching how to obtain copies of the Presidential Unit Citation (PUC) awarded to Nautilus for its historic and dangerous trip under the Arctic ice to reach the North Pole and establish a new Pacific to Atlantic via the North Pole (PANOPO) transit route. Additionally NAAI will purchase PUC medals. We will award both the citations and the medals to the PANOPOs in attendance and mail them to those unable to attend.



April 11, 2023, marked the 123rd birthday of the U.S. Navy Submarine Service. On that day in 1900, the Navy purchased it first submarine, the USS Holland VI. Since that date, the U.S. Navy Submarine Service has contributed incredibly to the defense of our country in every modern war and during the Cold War. Unfortunately, the submarine service has also lost countless lives. In World War II, 52 US submarines were lost, with a total of 3,506 officers and enlisted men killed. The US Navy Submarine Service had the highest casualty percentage of any American forces in the War: about 20%. And, more recently, so many lives were lost with the sinking of the USS Thresher and USS Scorpion. Perhaps British Prime Minister Winston Churchill put it best when he said, "Of all the branches of men in the forces there is none which shows more devotion and faces grimmer perils than the submariners."



SOME CLOSING HUMOR

The crusty old Chief was ashore for a couple of months while Nautilus underwent required maintenance.
